- ♦ The work of the Dean or delegate (PhD Chair or Associate Dean, Graduate Programs & Scholarship) must sit on a comprehensive exam committee as a part of their role and no additional remuneration applies.

In all instances, remuneration for the supervision of students should be processed upon *completion* of the supervision and a grade has been submitted.

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

On August 17, 2010, I received a report from a Special Committee composed of elected and appointed faculty members who made recommendations regarding course equivalency in the School of Social Work. This Committee was established under clause 3.17 of the MUN-MUNFA Collective Agreement. The Committee consisted of Drs. M. Devine, S. Ellenbogen, R. Klein, D. Mullings, and Prof. J. Parsons. The Committee consulted with faculty members in the School of Social Work and prepared a series of recommendations regarding course equivalencies. Previous committees prepared similar reports in 2003 and 1996.

I am writing this memo in accordance with clause 3.17(b) of the MUN-MUNFA Collective Agreement, to inform you of my determinations regarding course equivalencies.

I am pleased to advise you that I am in substantial agreement with the Committee's recommendations (please see their attached report). I accept the recommendations made by the committee with the following exceptions on page 3, Section (4), under the heading "Other (equivalency based on computation of average hours for course)".

My determination is as follows:

On page 4 of their August 17, 2010 report, the Committee made recommendations regarding the teaching norm in the School of Social Work. It is my understanding that the establishment of teaching norms is subject to a separate process under clause 3.09 of the MUN-MUNFA Collective Agreement. Therefore, I am unable to address this recommendation as part of my determination on course equivalencies.

I would like to thank the members of the Special Committee for their work and their comprehensive report. I apologize for the delay in making my determinations. I look forward to working with each of you throughout the coming year.

The Course Equivalency Committee established under Article 3.17 of the Collective Agreement commenced work on June 28, 2010. The Committee consulted faculty members in the School of Social Work and reviewed previous reports and correspondence regarding course equivalencies. We are now prepared to offer our recommendations regarding course equivalencies for the School.

CONTEXT

Course equivalencies in the School of Social Work were established in 1996, as reflected in a report submitted to the Director on April 25, 1996, by the Special Committee on Course Equivalency. In its report, the committee systematically laid out the hours devoted to each type of course offered in the School of Social Work. Courses offered in the undergraduate program were divided into four categories: 1) Service course or professional practice – knowledge based course; 2) Practice – knowledge with some practice skill; and 3) Practice – skill courses with significant evaluation of skill; and 4) Field internships. Course enrolments for each type were computed based on a formula that indicates a faculty member is expected to devote 129.79 hours per course per semester. The actual hours devoted to each course ranged from 153.5 hours to 168.5. The Committee reviewed this report and decided the computations done in 1996 continue to apply today.

The 1996 report also considered graduate courses. It distinguished between three types of MSW courses: 1) Practice – Knowledge with some practice skill; 2) Other courses such as research and critical thinking; and 3) Field internships. Subsequently, in a memo dated January 10, 2003, the Director set the equivalency for research internships. PhD courses were also addressed in the 1996 report. The report set equivalencies for the PhD courses, PhD tutorials, PhD internships, and PhD dissertations. As was the case with undergraduate

courses, the time needed to teach a graduate course was in excess of the 129.79 hour per course benchmark – in actuality taking between 166.5 hours and 183 hours.

RECOMMENDATIONS

The Committee opines the 1996 report and 2003 memo are the foundation for determining course equivalencies. Based on this report, we recommend the following:

Teaching Norm

The School of Social Work is one of only two academic units on the St. John's campus with a teaching norm of six (per Appendix E of the Collective Agreement). The teaching norm in other professional schools is either 4 (i.e., Medicine, Pharmacy) or 5 (i.e., Nursing, Business, Education). In actuality, the teaching load in the School of Social Work has, in practice, been five courses per year for the past seven or eight years.

Based on what has become the School's practice, and on the fact that the 1996 report on course equivalency indicates actual time devoted to teaching per course is 20 – 25% greater than time allotted per hours paid to work, we strongly recommend the Director declare a teaching norm of five courses, per Article 3.09 of the Collective Agreement.

CLOSING

We trust our recommendations are acceptable to the Director and will be implemented in the next round of teaching assignments. We welcome an opportunity to meet to discuss our recommendations and answer questions, should that be helpful. We are particularly concerned about agreement on the workload equivalency of the Pathway/Pathway Scholarship given that the level of workload credit will determine whether Pathway will proceed as conceived, or will need to be revised to fit within the workload credit given. The finer details of Pathway's implementation will be on the Graduate Studies Committee's agenda in Fall 2010.
